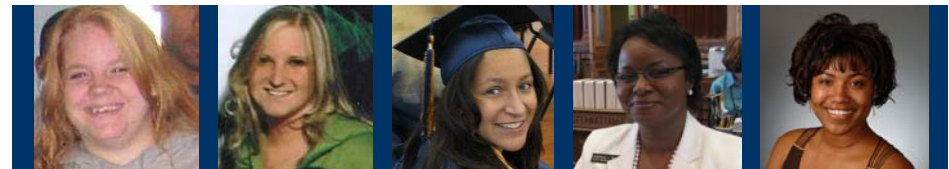

Overview

What is TRiO?

TRiO equals educational opportunity for low-income, first generation, and disabled Americans.

Our nation has asserted a commitment to providing educational opportunity for all Americans regardless of race, ethnic background, or economic circumstances.

Beginning with the creation of Upward Bound through the Higher Education Act of 1965, Congress has committed to helping low-income Americans enter and graduate from college. While student financial aid programs help students overcome financial barriers to higher education, TRiO programs help students overcome class, social, and cultural barriers to higher education.

Although the name “TRiO” initially came into use after the first three programs were authorized under the Higher Education Act, there are currently seven distinct programs that comprise the federal TRiO programs. Each plays a unique role in providing educational opportunity for eligible students.

The Future of TRiO in Iowa

Bridging the Gap

Currently, there are 27 TRiO programs in Iowa that serve middle and high school students. These programs are funded to serve 9,347 students. **Pre-college TRiO programs in Iowa are only able to serve 15.5% of the eligible population.** In 2005, the number of Iowa K-12 students eligible for the National School Free Lunch Program was 118,303. If 60,000 of these students are 5-12 graders, then we are under-serving this population of Iowans. Students eligible for the free lunch program are also eligible for TRiO.

Regarding TRiO programs that serve college students, there are 25 programs serving 4,512 students. In 2003-04, there were 67,449 Pell Grant recipients attending Iowa public and private, 2- and 4-year institutions. Pell Grants are awarded to the most financially needy students. Thus, **college TRiO programs in Iowa are only able to serve 6.7% of the eligible population.**

The Cost of Level-Funding & Policies

The Department of Education recommended in the 2006-2010 Talent Search grant competition that these programs serve fewer school districts and to serve closer districts more intensely. In Iowa alone, 25 school districts and 750 students have lost services due to this policy.

Level funding the past 4 years has strained programs' ability to recruit and retain quality staff members and serve students most effectively in the college preparation and retention process.

Conclusion

TRiO in Iowa Works!

TRiO programs in Iowa have a proven success rate.

Participants in the pre-college TRiO programs (Talent Search, Educational Opportunity Center, Upward Bound, Upward Bound Math/Science) graduate from high school and enroll in college at a higher rate than that of their peers, regardless of background.

Why TRiO?

TRiO programs help low-income / first-generation and disabled students achieve their dreams of continuing their education. According to federal guidelines, 67% of participants in any TRiO program must be both first-generation, low-income.

TRiO in Iowa

23 of Iowa's colleges and universities host 53 TRiO programs. These programs collectively received over \$16 million to administer services to over 16,800 Iowans during 2006-07.

Upward Bound

Goal

The goal of Upward Bound is to increase the rates at which participants enroll in and graduate from institutions of postsecondary education.

Upward Bound serves high school students from low-income families and high school students from families in which neither parent holds a bachelor's degree. A major feature of Upward Bound is a 4-6 week summer component where students live on a college campus and receive services.

Services

- Instruction in math, laboratory science, composition, literature, and foreign language
- Instruction in reading, writing, study skills, and other subjects necessary for success in education beyond high school
- Academic, financial, and personal counseling
- Exposure to academic programs and cultural events
- Tutorial services
- Mentoring programs
- Information on postsecondary education opportunities
- Assistance in completing college entrance and financial aid applications
- Assistance in preparing for college entrance exams
- Work study positions to expose participants to careers requiring a postsecondary degree

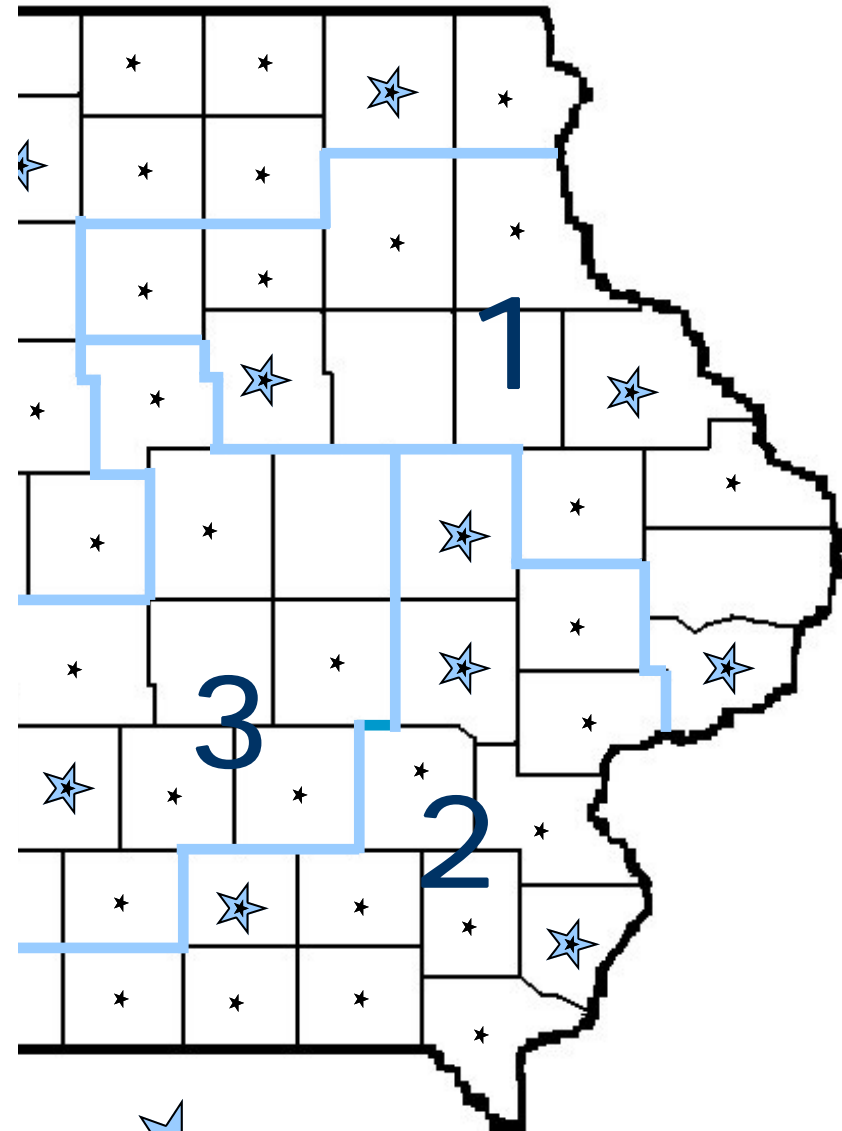

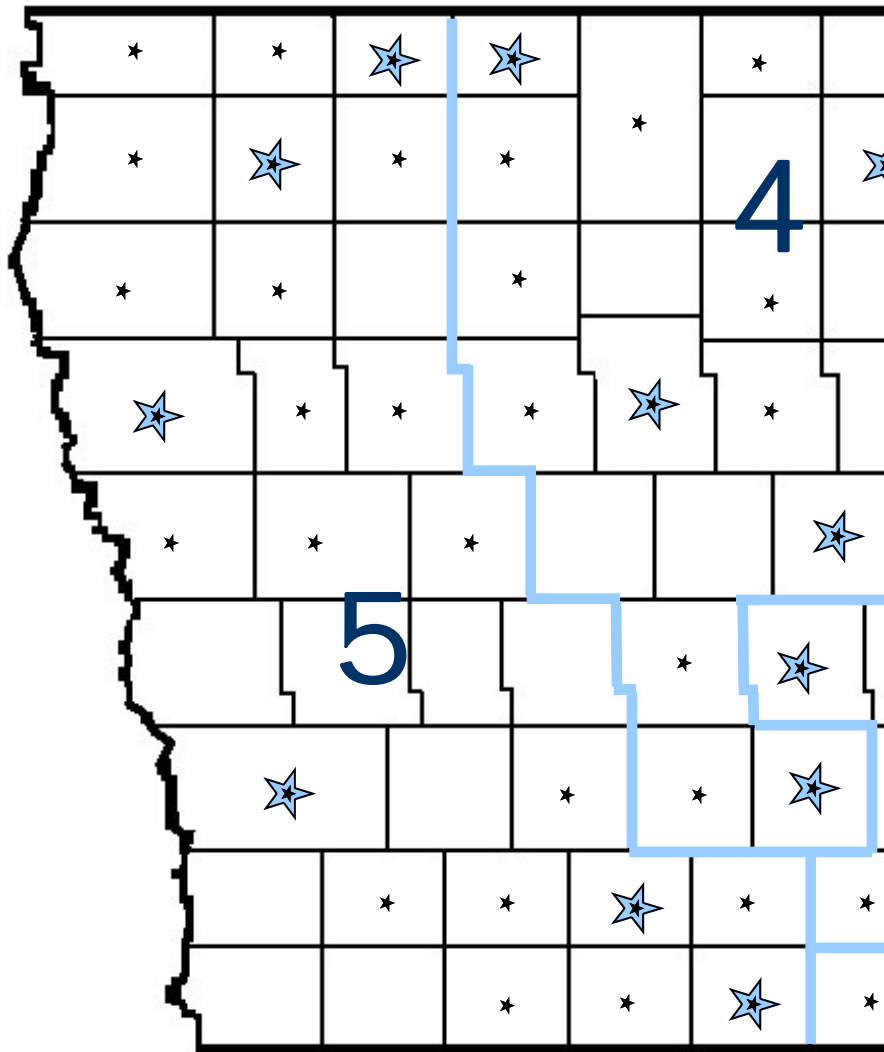

Laura comes from a single parent family, her mother is on disability. Laura’s family has been pretty negative when it comes to education. They find it snooty, unrealistic and a waste of time. She is truly a low income, first-generation student.

“My experience with the DMACC Upward Bound program has been one of the greatest opportunities of my life thus far. During the first semester of my senior year at Lincoln High School, I earned a 4.308 GPA, which raised my cumulative to 3.95. I’ve elected to take a full schedule this year, including four A.P. classes and two weighted classes. On top of maintaining my grades, I was working on a few college applications and with the help of my Upward Bound advisors, was able to finish them promptly. In addition, thanks to the Upward Bound program, I did not have to worry about application fees, a tremendous weight off of my shoulders and those of my mother as well.

*I am now a prospective Iowa Hawkeye with a twenty-thousand dollar academic scholarship awaiting my arrival. I plan on using it to assist me in my studies at the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. With a major in Ancient History and a double minor in International Studies and Political Science, **I hope to break new ground for myself and my family by doing something none of them have ever accomplished, graduating from a four year university.** I also plan to follow that up by doing my graduate studies at Brown University to earn a Doctorate in archaeology.*

I can not put into words how much I owe to the DMACC Upward Bound and all the people who have been there to help me along the way.”

Educational Talent Search

Goal

The goal of Educational Talent Search (ETS) is to increase the number of youth, 6th-12th grades, from disadvantaged backgrounds who complete high school and enroll in the postsecondary education institution of their choice.

Talent Search also serves high school dropouts, to age 27, by encouraging them to re-enter the educational system and complete their education.

- Academic, financial, career, or personal counseling including advice on entry or re-entry to secondary or postsecondary programs
- Career exploration and aptitude assessment
- Tutorial services
- Information on postsecondary education
- Exposure to college campuses
- Information on student financial assistance
- Assistance in completing college admissions and financial aid applications
- Assistance in preparing for college entrance exams
- Mentoring programs
- Special activities for sixth, seventh, and eighth graders
- Workshops for the families of participants

Upward Bound Math Science

Goal

The goal of Upward Bound Math Science (UBMS) is designed to help students recognize and develop their potential to excel in math and science and to encourage them to pursue postsecondary degrees in these fields.

This program is a specialized Upward Bound with math and science centers, designed to strengthen the math and science skills of participating students.

Services

- Summer programs consisting of intensive math and science training
- Year-round counseling and advisement
- Exposure to university faculty who do research in math and science
- Computer training
- Participant-conducted scientific research under the guidance of a faculty member or graduate student serving as the participant's mentor

Iowa Information

- 1 UBMS program at University of Northern Iowa
- Funded to serve 57 students for 2006-07
- Students from across Iowa have the opportunity to participate in UBMS. In 2005-06, participants came from Sioux City, Davenport, Council Bluffs, Waterloo, Columbus Junction and St. Ansgar.

Additionally, I was an active participant in the Educational Talent Search and Student Support Services programs. The educational and personal support I received from the TRIO Advisors was **instrumental** in my success. With their care, understanding and support, I learned to believe in myself and succeed, **no matter what any other person said or did.***

While involved in TRIO, I served as a mentor for middle school students through ‘Success for Sixth’ and at the Heartland Summer Camp. I was a founding member of Teens for Talent Search—a group chosen based on leadership potential, grade point average and overall ability to be exemplary.

I graduated in May of 2006 from Iowa State University, majoring in Communications Studies, minor in Sociology. I was fortunate enough to be awarded the Roy J. Carver Scholarship my junior and senior years. I am proud to say that I have achieved many personal successes. I am currently employed as the Marketing Manager for the new Wild Rose Casino & Resorts in Emmetsburg, Iowa.

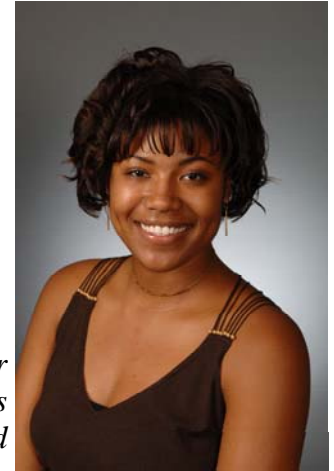

This program is designed to prepare participants for doctoral studies through involvement in research and other scholarly activities.

Institutions work closely with participants through their undergraduate requirements, encourage their entrance into graduate programs, and track their progress to successful completion of advanced degrees.

An Iowa Success Story—Deborah Berry

Several years ago Deborah faced an uncertain future. She wanted to go back to college and move beyond her career as a manager in retail sales. But the loans she defaulted on after earning an associate's degree from Hawkeye Community College were holding her back and she felt returning to school was not an option.

One day she took the advice of a friend and made an appointment with an UNI - TRIO Educational Opportunity Center counselor. One of the greatest challenges an adult person who wants to go back to school faces is defaulted loans. The perceived hopelessness of the situation can lead to a belief that there is no hope. However, after meeting with an UNI-EOC counselor Deborah's life began to change and hope was alive once more.

The TRIO program at the University of Northern Iowa's Center for Urban Education helped her through the process of paying those loans and applying for college.

Since that day, she has achieved many accomplishments in her life both academically and professionally. In 1998, she received her Bachelor of Science degree in Public Administration from Upper Iowa University and has been working toward her Master's degree.

Professionally after college, she obtained a position with the Waterloo Community Schools as an Education Site Coordinator of after school programs for at-risk youth. This position required a degree in higher education – a degree she now had. And as one opportunity lead to another, in January of 2000, Deborah was elected to serve as Waterloo's 4th Ward City Councilwoman, serving over 14,000 constituents. Today, she holds the position of State Representative for House District 22 in the Iowa State Legislature, representing over 30,000 constituents.

In addition to these accomplishments, Deborah was also honored in 2003 as one of four people receiving the National TRIO Achievers Award during the Council of Opportunity in Education's annual conference in San Diego.

Deborah's accomplishments both academically and professionally show her strong determination. Her accomplishments reinforce the idea that education is the key to preparing us for future leadership roles and also show how TRIO plays an important role in assisting individuals to accomplish their goals.
